Death of a Member

Ronald J. Foster Sr.



Ronald J. "Ronnie" Foster Sr., age 86, of Maryville, Illinois passed away on Tuesday, August 16, 2022, at Anderson Hospital in Maryville, Illinois. He was born June 6, 1936, in Glen Carbon, Illinois, a son of the late John E. and Agnes J. (Johnson) Foster.

Ronald married the love of his life, Joan G. (Treat) Foster on December 31, 1958, at the St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Glen Carbon and she survives.

He retired in 1998 as the Vice-president of St. Louis Lithographing Company after 34 years of dedicated service. He proudly served his country with the United States Air Force for four years. A faithful member of St. Thomas Episcopal Church since he was baptized as an infant, he had served many capacities in the church including serving on the Bishop Committee, serving as treasurer and was very instrumental in establishing the church daycare center and the expansion of the church building. Ronald was dedicated to the Village of Glen Carbon throughout his lifetime and proudly achieved an abundance of the growth and expansion of the village serving 16 years as a Village Trustee and serving 20 years as the Village Mayor from 1981 until 2001. He received much proclamation for

his service to the village but was overwhelmed by the naming of the Ronald J. Foster Heritage Trail for his achievements. He cherished his family, loved spending time with his grandchildren; enjoyed his days of traveling, fishing, cooking, remodeling his home, and a nice summer night enjoying his ice cream. He also had a love of arts and enjoyed visits to a museum, nice concert, or a play, was a history buff and proud of his years of family genealogy and was an avid fan of the Illini and Edwardsville Tigers football. He was also a member of the Genl George Rogers Clark Chapter of the Illinois Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

In addition to his beloved wife of over 63 years, he is survived by three sons and two daughters-in-law, Steve and Christine Foster of Arvada, Colorado, Gregory Foster of Collinsville, Illinois, and Ron and Jamie Foster Jr. of Glen Carbon; seven grandchildren and spouses, Leah and Matt Hosburgh, Jeffrey Foster, Jennifer and Joe Bainbridge, Nicholas Foster, Madelyn Foster, Adam Foster and Lydia Foster; seven great grandchildren, Asher, Miles, Oliver, Sage, Kyle, Amelia, and William; a brother and sister-in-law, Bill and Linda Sue Foster of Glen Carbon; a sister and brother-in-law, Linda Lee and Max Helfer of Glen Carbon; a brother-in-law, Dennis Johnson of Edwardsville; many nieces; nephews; other extended family and many friends. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a sister, Nancy Johnson.

In celebration of his life, visitation was held at Irwin Chapel in Glen Carbon on Friday, August 19, 2022. The funeral service was held at St. Thomas Episcopal Church in Glen Carbon on Saturday, August 20, 2022, with Father Eugene Stormer officiating. Burial with full military honors followed at the Glen Carbon City Cemetery in Glen Carbon.

John D. Coleman 1934 – 2022



John D. Coleman, age 88 of Greenville, passed away at his home on Sunday, September 11, 2022.

John Dennis Coleman was born on Thursday, February 1, 1934, in Freeport, Illinois, the son of John Richard and Margaret O. (Schamberger) Coleman. He spent his childhood growing up in Mt. Carroll, Collinsville, and mostly Smithboro, Illinois. He was the last graduate from Smithboro High School and

graduated from Mulberry Grove High School in 1951, and had degrees from University of Illinois, Greenville College, and Southern Illinois University. In the 1950s, John served in the U.S. Army and was stationed at West Point, New York. After he left the Army, he became an art teacher and taught at Edwardsville High School, and Greenville Elementary and Junior High Schools. In the 1960s

he also worked for the Illinois State Superintendent of Schools as a Supervisor for Art Instruction. After retiring from teaching in 1990, John spent much of his time volunteering with local organizations including the Bond County Historical Society, the Hills Fort Society, the Sons of the American Revolution, the Illinois War of 1812 Society, Farm Heritage Museum, AMVETS, and was a past member of the Greenville Public Library Board.

John had a lifelong love for art, especially painting and drawing. He was a founding member of the Prairie Artist guild and for many years taught adult painting classes.



In 1973, Jim earned his Ed.D. from the University of Missouri—Columbia. In 1988, he co-authored a text book on Missouri government with Darryl Stacy. After retiring from the Hazelwood School District in 2000, Jim worked at Missouri Baptist College passing his love of teaching to a new generation of teachers.

With his wife Carol Bimes, whom he married on March 30, 1985, Jim travelled the world, visiting over 15 countries. He was an intrepid tour guide for friends and family.



Charles McKittrick, Jr. 1929 – 2022



Charles Everett McKittrick, Jr., a member of the Genl George Rogers Clark Chapter of the Illinois Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, was born July 7, 1929, in Memphis, Tennessee. He passed away September 3, 2022 at his Bethesda home in the Fox Hill community he loved and where he had been thriving for over 6 years. Charles graduated from Duke in the Spring of 1950, and entered sales training school at IBM. As the Ko-

rean War worsened, Charles enlisted in the Air Force serving as Second Lieutenant. Charles re-joined IBM after the Air Force, moving from salesman, to branch manager to regional manager to becoming a pioneer in Banking and a specialist in Public Sector marketing. His success with government sales, combined with an enduring passion for politics, led IBM to ask Charles to start and develop what would eventually become a groundbreaking Public Affairs office in Washington DC, where he retired, after 40 years as Vice President.

Driven by a thirst for knowledge and experience, Charles was a consummate traveler: he traveled around the world as a bachelor, internationally as a global executive, and in retirement where he traveled for 25 years with his longtime companion Charlotte Potler Klein. Visiting over 70 countries, Charles especially loved train travel: Trans-Siberian Railway from Vladivostok to Moscow;

Beijing to Moscow through Central Asia; across Australia; across Canada; London to Venice; Cairo to Luxor; Adelaide to Alice Springs; and Johannesburg to Cape Town.

Charles' curiosity did not stop with politics and travel. He was a consummate student and collector. His collections ranged from European porcelain, to Native American art, to political cartoons of the late 19th and 20th century. His most prized collection filled a climate controlled room-full of over 3,500 Spanish Civil War books, pamphlets, magazines, newspapers, and musical recordings.

Chuck, as he was known to many, could be tough. He was opinionated, definitive, and always well informed. Yet, as someone recently remarked, "he was as affable, kind, patient and humble as he was brilliant and accomplished." He learned from everyone, regardless of status, and everyone learned from him. He was a sought after confidant, as well as impactful board member - serving the Washington Hospital Center Board for 18 years, the Institute of American Indian Art for 10, and the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity for 6.

Veterans Day Memorial Service

On Friday, November 11, 2022, the Ninian Edwards Chapter National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, in cooperation with the Wood River Heritage Council and the City of Wood River held a Veterans Day Memorial Service and Dedication of Crosses for Unmarked Graves at Vaughn Cemetery in Wood River, Illinois.

The Genl George Rogers Clark Chapter of the Illinois Society Sons of the American Revolution and the Society of the War of 1812 in Illinois were asked to provide a color guard.

Twenty-nine white wooden crosses had been assembled, painted, and plced in the cemetery prior to the ceremony. The Mayor of Wood River gave a short address and the names of the families who had no markers were read by Dee Blasa of the Ninian Edwards Chapter DAR.

The turnout was excellent even though the temperature was low and the wind was not.
