Chapter Annual Meeting Was Fun at Alton Casino—You Bet!

GGRCC made its move for the 22nd Annual Meeting Feb. 6 to the Argosy Casino on the Alton riverfront—not to the slots, but to the banquet room.

Special guests included ILSSAR President Carl Reed and wife Esther, DAR officials, and wives of chapter members.

The appointments of Alan Y. Harrison as registrar and Gaylord J. James as vice president were approved.

Entertainment was provided by the piano stylings and vocals of Marty Heiman of Fairview Heights. He led the assemblage in sing-along of old favorites at the program's conclusion.

After reports by President Timothy S. Raymer and other officers, former President Alan Y. Harrison announced winners of chapter awards.

They included two wives of members: Marilyn Campbell, Madison County Historical Society genealogist, for documenting Revolutionary patriots who lived in the county, and Camilla Laughlin, for preparing applications for chapter members.

For chapter activities, receiving oak leaf clusters, tie tacks or certificates of appreciation were color guard members Donald E. Campbell, William R. Feeney, M. Joseph Hill, Troy M. Huddle and Harry K. Windland. Feeney also was cited for Flag Award chairmanship, Windland for several chapter and state achievements, Campbell for chairing ROTC and Law Enforcement

awards, and Hill, coordinating chapter trips.

Other recipients were chapter officers Raymer, Edwin G. Gerling, Gaylord J. James, Kenneth W. Leroy Sr. and G. Thomas Lawrence, who chaired the 2007 Patriot marker event.

Trivia from Registrar Records

Members since the chapter formed in 1986 have totaled 156; 106 have separated by death, withdrawal or relocation, leaving 50 current members.

Two members have links to nine patriots each—Alan Y. Harrison and Harry K. Windland.

Harry has the only female patriot, Tabitha Pearson, who supplied provisions for the South Carolina militia.

Leading recruiter is chapter founder Charles B. Schweizer, 75 members. Next are Windland, 33 members, and M. Joseph Hill, 12 members.

Record holding patriot on member applications has been Ebenezer Flagg, with 12. A descendant and member, Norman Gershom Flagg, had already been a SAR member since Jan. 18, 1907.

The American Creed

William Tyler Page, as an entry into a patriotic contest, wrote the American Creed. The U.S. House of Representatives adapted it in 1918.

William Tyler Page was born in 1868 and died in 1942. He descended from a signer of the Declaration of Independence, Carter Brazton, and from the 10th President of the United States, John Tyler. Page served as a page at the U.S. Capitol at the age of 13, thus beginning a 61-year-long career as a national servant.

At the age of 49, he wrote the "American Creed." His goal was to bring to public awareness a complete statement of patriotic faith. Drawing from wide variety of historical documents such as the Preamble of the American Constitution, Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, the Declaration of Independence, and other national writings, he crafted a simple, yet profoundly moving expression of American patriotism.

His submission was chosen from more than 3,000 entries. The creed often comprises part of the naturalization ceremony for new Americans.

Concerning the Creed, in Page's own words:

"The American Creed is a summing up, in one hundred words, of the basic principles of American political faith. It is not an expression of individual opinions upon the obligations and duties of American citizenship or with respect to its rights and privileges. It is a summary of the fundamental principles of American political faith as set forth in its greatest documents, its worthiest traditions, and by its greatest leaders."

For many years, Page had served as the president-general of the United States Flag Association. The night before his death, he gave an address to the Daughters of the American Revolution on the 50th Anniversary of the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

The last picture taken of him shows him with his hand over his heart, gazing at the symbol of the country he loved.

This single entry in a nationwide contest brought forth many changes in American attitudes, producing increased pride in the United States. Even at the age of 90, these simple, few words, are as powerful as any large, well-armed Army could be.
